EASTER HAPPENINGS


BUCKINGHAM: The Easter Sunrise Service was well attended - about 25 cars.

CHURCH OUTREACH

BUCKINGHAM: The church ministered to 3 families that have lost loved ones with food, cards, and phone calls. The pastor and deacons check in on the elderly at least weekly.

CHESTNUT GROVE: \$35 was given to the Ruth School.

FITZGERALD MEMORIAL: April 24 was the BBQ fundraiser for missions. Three hundred chickens and dinners (combined) were sold.

JONES CHAPEL: Plans are being made for a team to attend MC@ at Eagle Eyrie during July.

MT. ZION: The WMU donated \$500 to the Bland Ministry Center, \$500 to WMU of Virginia for the kits being made for Standing Rock, and \$300 to graduation gift bags for Buckingham seniors.

SHARON: The congregation is growing a special offering to support the Bland Ministry Center. They are also contributing hygiene kits for summer delivery by the WMUV mission team to the Standing Rock Sioux tribe in North & South Dakota. The Rose of Sharon WMU continues providing meals, cards, phone calls, and visits to those who are sick or homebound.

MULBERRY GROVE: The major focus for April was the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering. Members also participated in the card shower for the BCHS graduates. They contributed 134 handwritten cards. Individuals continue to volunteer at the bimonthly food distribution at the Crystal Cathedral. The outreach ministry is ongoing with calls, cards food, and the delivery of church literature.

JRBA LEARNS & GROWS>>>

MT. ZION: During February and March, the Girls in Action Mission Group set up a table in the church with info and collected baby items and money for the Pregnancy Support Center. The items collected included 7 blankets, clothing, bottles, and 5 boxes of 1200 baby wipes. These were delivered to the Dillwyn office, along with monetary donations of \$268.00. During March, the Mt. Zion Girls in Action learned about missionaries to New York City and sampled different foods including bagels, New York style pizza, and New York onion sauce for their hot dogs. They watched a movie about St. Patrick and drew a life-sized Annie Armstrong with facts about her and our Annie Armstrong Easter Offering. The children also participated in a Passover meal which included a hand washing (instead of foot washing). They also learned about the meaning of each part of the meal, the Passover story, and how it relates to Jesus' death and resurrection. They had a Easter Egg Hunt and searched for items related to Jesus' death and resurrection.

JRBA Quarterly Executive Board Meeting April 12, 2021

Mrs. Marilyn Snoddy, Moderator, opened the meeting by sharing a devotional on I Peter 5:7: Cast all your anxiety on Him because He cares for you. It is hard to cast all anxieties on Jesus, but we are blessed that His word is always available to us. In Mark 4:38, the disciples and Jesus were on a boat when a furious squall came up. Jesus was asleep in the boat. The disciples asked, "Teacher, don't you care if we drown?" Storms are scary and we've been experiencing a scary time, too...the pandemic as well as turmoil in our country and world. We look around and we are prone to worry about our children and grandchildren, finances, and other things...Where would we be without our faith in Jesus and without the knowledge that He cares for us? Sometimes we get discouraged and may even say, "Who cares anyway?" But JESUS CARES - He cared enough to die for us. God's plan is not always our plan. Every storm we go through helps us to grow. Elijah didn't plan to be isolated or to be fed by a raven; people don't plan to get the virus or not be able to go out. But God sent folks to help them, and us, out when needed. It is hard when we don't see fruit. When we do see fruit, even once, it makes our trust and faithfulness worth it all. Stress is unhealthy. When anxiety or stress creeps in, hold onto His promise, He care for you. Marilyn then prayed a blessing on our meeting.

Marilyn then called the meeting to order and Frank Breault, Clerk, had the roll call of churches. There were 24 in attendance, representing 10 member churches plus one visitor.

The minutes of the January, 2021, Executive Board Meeting were presented and approved. The Treasurer's Quarterly Report was presented by Judy Ownby. As of March 31. 2021, the checking account balance was \$47,534.97, which included the following: Additional Missions Fund - \$900.00, Mission Trips - \$2,200.00; Rise Against Hunger - \$12, 686.65, Missions Blitz - \$634.76, and Bland Ministry - \$1,050.00. Total Disbursements for the quarter were \$6,966.20 which included: Mission Trips (Hope for Appalachia) -\$1,430.00 (\$1,280 designated donations + \$50 per team member), and Mission Blitz - \$541.45. Total receipts for the guarter were \$18,568.13 which included church contributions of \$10,138.75, designated contributions of \$1,280 for Hope, an individual contribution of \$500, \$14.60 from Amazon.smile, \$550 for Bland Ministry Center, \$6,079.65 designated contributions for Rise Against Hunger, and \$5.13 interest on the checking account. The Savings Account Balance is \$4,324.65. Judy explained that the Rise Against Hunger funds (\$12,686.65) were dispersed after April 1, so were still listed in the checking account balance. The report was approved as presented.

Next, Marilyn gave the Moderator's Report by noting that although we are still in a pandemic, JRBA has been busy for our Lord! She noted that a lot has been accomplished - we sent 1,035 Hope boxes to Kentucky and many folks were involved in this effort: Fitzgerald Memorial served as a vaccination site and many JRBA folks volunteered at the Buckingham clinic; \$12,685.65 was raised and contributed to Rise Against Hunger; Church Clerks from all 18 churches completed the Annual Church Profile for 2020: Our Missions Blitz effort provided a new ramp for a handicapped individual; JRBA church contributed over \$12,000 to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering and have already contributed over \$6,000 to the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for North American Missions; Churches are encouraged to make monetary contributions to the Bland Ministry Center (by May 1) and to participate in sending cards to the BCHS graduates (by April 30). Marilyn also asked that if anyone does not have access to the JRBA newsletter, please let Phyllis know.

Next, Marilyn called for the Officers' reports. Rev. Jimmy Dunn, Sunday School Director, noted that he was glad to report that some

churches had resumed Sunday School either virtually or in-person. He encouraged all churches to resume in-person SS or Bible Study as soon as possible. He asked that everyone do all that can be done to teach God's word to all ages. He also encouraged churches to schedule VBS for the children in our communities. VBS Team Leader, Valeria Breault, notes that as churches plan for VBS. Mardel's of Lynchburg is an excellent resource for materials. Mrs. Betty Toney, WMU Director, noted that churches have given over \$1,000 through the Baby Bottle drive for the Southside Pregnancy Center. She encouraged churches to do cards for the graduates. Marilyn noted that BCHS is planning a "Prom in a Box" - contact Michelle Wright if your church is interested in making a donation for that effort. Austin Williams updated everyone on the progress at the BCM (Longwood/Hampden Sydney). He noted that they are almost at the end of the school year and that he has been meeting with student leaders for next year. He also announced that he is now the permanent BCM Director. A round of applause expressed our excitement over his new role.

Marilyn called for Committee Reports next. Rita Harris, Nominating Committee Chair, presented the Slate of Officers for 2021-2022 as follows:

Parliamentarian (Appointed by Moderator) – Mr. Gwynn Tyler and WMU Director (Elected by WMU) – Mrs. Betty Toney. The Slate of Officers was approved as presented. Currently serving on the BGAV Mission Council – Rev. Perry Clore, Rev. Jimmy Dunn, Rev. Henry Enochs, Jr., Mrs. Marilyn Snoddy, and Mr. Gwynn Tyler. (Rev. Jimmy Dunn and Gwynn Tyer will complete their terms at the BGAV Annual Meeting in November, 2021. The Nominating Committee will submit the names of Rev. Roger Wood and Rev. Anthony Saaco to the Mission Council for their consideration as Council Members. The Mission Council considers all recommendations and selects those to be voted on at the BGAV Annual Meeting. (*The number of persons serving on the BGAV Mission Council is being reduced through attrition so submitted names may not go forward unless needed.*)

The Program Committee presented a recommendation to the Executive Board that:

- 1. JRBA begin plans to host an Annual Fall Meeting in spite of the continuing pandemic.
- The Program Committee be allowed to change the location for the meeting if a larger space is needed for social distancing. (Goshen would traditionally be the next host church, and would be the next to host post-pandemic if conditions warrant a change of venue.)
- 3. No meal be planned.
- 4. Masks be required for the meeting unless restrictions have been lifted.
- The meeting be held on Thursday, October 21, 2021, beginning at 6:30 PM (business) followed by worship at 7:15 PM.

The committee will continue to monitor the restrictions of the pandemic, make necessary adjustments, and keep the churches informed. A comment was made that we need to move forward with plans. The recommendation of the Program Committee was approved as presented.

Michelle Wright, Baccalaureate Chair for Buckingham, submitted a request to be able to use the \$200 budgeted by JRBA for the Baccalaureate, for the purchase of cupcakes for the BCHS graduates. There will not be an in-person Baccaluareate again this year. A motion was made, seconded, and approved that funds be accessible for this purpose. It was noted that Cumberland has not submitted a request yet.

Rev. Jimmy Dunn presented a report from the Missions Committee. He expressed gratitude for the generosity of our churches to Rise Against Hunger and churches were encouraged to continue to collect for this worthy cause. He also thanked all who helped with the efforts for Hope for Appalachia. Rev. Dunn noted that he knew the boxes were received with joy. Everyone was encouraged to get involved with the Blue Ridge Food Distribution every 2nd and 4th Friday. Rev. Dunn encouraged our churches to make contributions to the Bland Ministry Center. He encouraged everyone to continue to do all the mission work possible locally.

Rev. Woody Moore spoke about the recent Hope for Appalachia trip. He thanked everyone for the effort and timely delivery of Hope boxes. Bell Elementary School, JRBA's adopted school, made thank you posters and notes expressing their gratefulness. The team was able to have limited interaction with some of the students. He shared notes from two of the students. He also noted that the principal told the Easter story over the intercom. Rev. Moore requested prayer for a gentleman who has been instrumental in paving the way for HFA who has cancer. He noted that about 1,250 boxes were transported along with several boxes of additional supplies. Two churches in Tappahannock prepared boxes in addition to those already reported. "Dolls on a Mission" provided 2,000 dolls (boy and girl dolls) with the Gospel message for the schools. Rev. Moore noted that the schools were well-covered with HOPE boxes, but noted that there is much more to the trip than boxes – it's about Jesus! They encountered numerous ways that HFA is making a difference in the schools and communities touched by this effort.

Rev. Michael Khol noted that Missions Blitz is currently planning to assist with repairing a needy family's kitchen floor. He hopes there will be additional projects in the near future. He is trying to do small projects with individual churches to reach needs in our area. He will contact pastors when a need arises. It was noted that designated funds are being used and that additional donations would be helpful. If you or your church would like to donate, please send a check payable to JRBA with "Missions Blitz" on the memo line of the check. These monies are used for materials when a project is undertaken.

Marilyn welcomed Rev. Skip Wallace, BGAV Strategist, to the meeting. He noted his excitement over being in attendance and being able to hear about all that JRBA is doing for the Lord. Rev. Dunn asked him if the BGAV Annual Meeting will take place this year and Skip said the BGAV leadership is hopeful that it will. He will update us as decisions are made.

Gwynn Tyler noted that he had been in touch with Dee Dee Hoosier, Director, at the Bland Ministry Center and that our team would not be going this year, but that the ministry is still serving the people of the area. Since we cannot go or send items, monetary donations would be most appreciated. Contributions are due to JRBA by May 1 – put "Bland Ministry Center" on the memo line of the check. He also informed everyone that the Director's husband passed away.

There was no additional old or new business.

Additional announcements were then made:

- There is a BGAV Mission Council meeting via Zoom on April 27. Mission Council members should register for the meeting and plan to attend.
- VBS dates for Antioch (Scottsville), Jones Chapel, and First Baptist Dillwyn were announced. Buckingham and Cedar are currently planning for VBS as well.


