V.B.S. FOLLOW-UP

MT. ZION: VBS was held the week of June 5 – 9. Mega Sports Camp – HEART of a Champion was the theme. Hero – Jesus is my Hero; Endurance – Jesus' love Endures even when I make mistakes; Alert – Jesus always sees exactly what I need; Ready – Just like Jesus, I am Ready to respond; Triumphant – I can be with Jesus forever! The Scritpure reference of the week was Romans 5:8: But God demonstrates His love toward us, in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us. Each child was given a backpack and a water bottle to keep and use during the week. Each night the children had an Opening Rally with the pledges and singing followed by dinner. After dinner the younger children had class with music, crafts, recreation time, and Bible stories. The older children went to their first sports session. Each night they participated in a different sport including basketball, kickball, volleyball, and soccer. After the first sports session, there was a Halftime Rally with singing and a story about a sports figure that related to the theme of the night, followed by another sports session. The Closing Rally each night was a Bible Stoy.

The Bible stories included the story of Creation, Sin Entering the World, Jesus' Birth, Death, and Resurrection, and the message of Salvation. On the last night there was a Closing Program with singing and a Bible Stoy with parents in attendance. Certificates were prewsented to all who attended along with a final drawing for more prizes where every child received a prize. The evening ended with a cookout and a game of kickball with the parents vs. the kids. There was a toal of 28 children and 24 volunteers participting during the week. Mt. Zion praises God for 2 professions of faith, great weather (one night of rain and wonderful leaders who improvised for sports sessions), amazing volunteers that made the week a success, and a wonderful group of kids that made everything worth it! A Missions Offering of \$300 was taken for Hope for Appalachia. Dorothy Davis was the VBS Director.

CEDAR: VBS was held the week of Jne 12 – 16 for children ages 2 ½ - 12 years old with a total enrollment of 106 and a nightly average of 80. The children decided to send their total offering for the week to Samaritan Purse for the needs in Ukraine. The curriculum used was "Boot Camp" (Biblical Outlook & Outreach Training from Truth Ministries). Kathleen Llewellyn served as VBS Director.

TAR WALLET: VBS was held at Tar Wallet June 13 – 17. It was very successful with 17 children and 18 workers enrolled. Nine of those children were preschoolers! "Tomorrow & Beyond" was the curriculum used and Lena Chapman was the VBS Director. On Friday the children presented a program for the parents with refreshments were served after the program. As a VBS mission project, 51 cans of food were collected for the local food bank.

ANTIOCH (SCOTTSVILLE): A Book Exchange has been set up in the back hallway of the church so that folks can leave books or Bibles for others to enjoy, or pick up something they want to read!

MULBERRY GROVE: The youth of the church spent the week of June 20 – 24, at Camp CrossRoads. It was an amazing week learning about God and getting to connect with each other. Ten youth and three chaperones attended.

MT. ZION: In May, the Girls in Action learned about the Begin Anew Ministry in Nashville, Tennessee, that ministers to people living in poverty and shares the Gospel of Jesus Christ with them. Their focus verse was Proverbs 14:31: Anyone who crushes poor people makes fun of their Maker. But anyone who is kind to those in need honors God. The girls learned facts about Nashville and Tennessee and sampled foods that they are famous for, including Moon Pie, Little Debbie Cakes, hot chicken sandwiches, and Mountain Dew. They played games to learn more about the ministry and to help memorize the Bible verse. They made Butterfly murals to hang in the hallway of the church. The girls cleaned an area in the church as their service project of the month.

In June, the girls learned about missionaries serving refugees from Venezuela in Columbia. Their Bible Story for the month was the story of Noah and the Ark.
