HOPE FOR APPALACHIA TEAM REPORT

What an awesome God we serve! He allowed us to be back in our schools doing the ministry of spreading the Gospel as well as meeting needs. We took 10 people out to Bell County this spring: Wayne Gough, Roger Woody, Darlene Woody, Gloria Newton, Nancy Kidd, Nathaniel Vaught, Kyle Vaught, Donna Norton, Brenda McAllister, and myself made up "Team Woody". We delivered 1,132 boxes to our four schools, along with 532 dolls, 575 wrist bands, 28 special needs blankets/quilt (Mt. Zion sewing team), three bags of throws, 16 – 18 boxes of cookies for the staff, teacher gifts for all staff, and multiple extra supplies to all four schools. We were able to help two other teams with boxes: 332 were given to cover schools for which the teams did not have enough. We also delivered at lest two dozen prom dresses to Bell High School.

The most important part was sharing the Gospel with the children. We had 99 to accept Christ in our four schools. What an opportunity to serve Him!

I personally want to thank each one for your prayers and support for Hope. This is a community effort. The prayer support is always felt and the effects are definitely seen. Linda Gough helped the team prepare right up to the last Wednesday packing, stepped out to have bypass surgery on Friday while praying for and cheering us on. God blessed her with successful surgery and recovery. While other teams struggled with regulations for being able to go into their schools, ours were open to the full program without hesitation. That is prayer at work! God is faithful to answer those prayers!

The Bland Mission Team left from the FBC parking lot on Sunday, May 15, about 2 PM, after joining hands and being prayed for by our Missions Chair, Rev. Jimmy Dunn, and the Moderator, Rev. Michael Khol.

We had a beautiful week serving at the Bland Ministry Center. We served in the Food Warehouse and the Clothing Closet as well as with odd jobs around the Ministry Center and at the Volunteer House.

This year food was given out on two days so we assisted with both preparing the commodities for distribution, as well as, delivering boxes of food and carts of produce to the cars of individuals who came for assistance. The Tuesday distribution is for those who qualify to receive USDA foods and the Thursday distribution is for anyone who comes. 45 families were assisted on Tuesday with groceries including non-perishable foods, meats, breads, fresh produce,

drinks, and desserts. Additionally, containers of hand sanitizer were given out. On Thursday, approximately 140+ families were assisted with a smaller amount of the same items. We were impressed with the quality of the food given out, especially the meats and produce. Most of the food is donated by large chain stores like WallMart and Sam's, that make multiple deliveries each week. It is overwhelming to think of all the needs that are met through this food ministry. A great deal of work has come along with the additional partner deliveries. All of the food now has to be weighed and the amount distributed reported. In 2021, 516,705 pounds of donated food items were unloaded, weighed, and put away...then prepared for distribution and given out! But in addition to their regular volunteers, (who come day after day, week after week, month after, month), work crews from the Bland Correctional Center come each Thursday to complete Community Service and are a great help in all sorts of ways. They do much of the yardwork, assist loading the cars with heavy items, and have even done some carpentry and mechanical jobs around the center. And, of course, volunteer teams still come almost every week of the summer months from churches and associations throughout Virginia and several other states. The Ministry Center has also received a grant from the Western Blue Ridge Baptist Network for some much-needed warehouse equipment that included an electric pallet jack and freight scales. Our volunteers helped unload trucks and pack food boxes, but they were most blessed by the interaction with the clients as they carried the groceries and fresh produce to the cars.

Folks can also go to the Clothing Closet each week to select items for their families. They can come as often as they like, but can only receive 50 pounds of clothing per month. Once they reach their limit, they must wait until the next month to return. A lot of other household items are also given away, but they do not count in the 50 pound allowance. Our volunteers helped unbag, sort, and hang clothes for the long racks of items available for the clients' selection. There are always waiting bags to be gone through, so when folks weren't needed in the food warehouse, they would go to the clothes closet to help out there. For many years, items for the clothing ministry have been supplied by Blanket America Ministries, but due to the age and health of many of their volunteers, their drop-offs from estate donations have stopped. Of course, clean, "gently-used" clothing (especially children's clothes, shoes, plus size items, and jeans), NEW undergarments and toiletries are always needed. While there is the 50 pound monthly weight limit, all clothing distributed to the clients is free of charge. It is such a blessing to see mothers "shopping" through the long racks of clothing to select items for their families.

The team worked hard, but also had a wonderful time together. We definitely ate well as we prepared all of our own meals and enjoyed each other's favorite recipes! We also grew spiritually during the week. Each night we gathered after supper for a time of reflection and devotions, sharing how we had seen the Lord's hand in the activities of the day. We shared from His Word nightly and prayed together for the work of the center, for our families and friends, and for each other. What a joy the warm fellowship provided!

We want to thank all of the churches and individuals who gave monetary donations for the team and for the Ministry Center. A check for \$1,568.14 (money specifically designated for the Ministry Center) was presented to Dee Dee Hoosier at the beginning of the week (picture below). From the remaining funds, we supplemented the food carried from home, bought some needed linens and household supplies for the Volunteer House, and were able to order the parts to repair the stove used by the volunteer teams during the summer months. At the end of the week, all remaining funds (\$1,504.00) were given to BMC for their continuing ministry. The team's expenses totaled \$761.00 and a total of \$3,072.14 was given to the Ministry Center. Dee Dee and the staff were most appreciative of the monetary donations, but also for the dedication of JRBA and their continued prayer and volunteer support. They always welcome us with open arms – it's like returning to family! If you have not been to the Bland Ministry Center, schedule a trip to see this ministry arm of Virginia Baptists and the Alma Hunt Offering. And, begin praying NOW about the possibility of being a part of the 2023 Bland Mission Team. We have reserved the week of May 21 – 27, 2023, to go and work at the center. God will allow you to BE a blessing, but He will also bless YOU if you are willing to serve.

MULBERRY GROVE: On May 1, the two youngest Sunday School classes (Kindergarten – 5th grade) put together 75 Teacher Appreciation bags for the middle school staff. They also each put together a gift bag to take to their own teachers as appreciation for all their hard work and for "rocking"

another difficult year.





MULBERRY GROVE (CONT'D): After church on May 1, a group of members participated in a community-wide road clean-up. 75 bags of trash were collected. The roads are looking good in Buckingham County! Inspired by an idea they had on Easter (where they visited the homebound and brought worship to them), Mulberry Grove has begun a once a month initiative to take "church" to their homebound. On May 22, six church members visited Dicky Spencer at the Heritage Hall nursing home and wee able to celebrate communion together. How sweet it is to break bread in such a way. The church anticipates continuing this tradition on the 4th Sunday of each month during the Sunday School hour. Mulberry Grove's WMU is planning a Tea for June 26. Gwynn and Phyllis Tyler served on the JRBA Bland Mission Team and the church contributed to the Ministry Center and the trip.

OPPORTUNITIES TO SERVE>>>

- BGAV MISSIONS 4:7 CARE BOXES FOR UKRAINIAN REFUGEES: As of May 9, gifts from individuals and churches toward Aid for Ukraine totaled more than \$353,000. Virginia Baptists express their appreciation for your continued support as they work with partners to provide for those fleeing the conflict. Some of the funds donated were directed to Project Ruth in their response to the crisis. Donations also provided the weekly transport of much needed food and supplies to the Ukrainian refugees in the Odessa area. This food is packed in 4:7 CARE BOXES, each of which meets the caloric and protein needs for a family of four for seven days. Currently, 1200 boxes will be supplied which cost approximately \$44 each. The 4:7 CARE BOXES contain canned meats, grains, legumes, canned & dried vegetables, healthy fats, seasonings, and sucrose. JRBA Gathers Together...

After two years of absence from gathering, four pastors, thirty messengers, and one visitor met for the **188th JRBA Semi-Annual Spring Meeting** on Thursday, May 26, 2022, at Goshen Baptist Church. As folks gathered in the sanctuary, photos from the recent Bland Mission Trip and Hope for Appalachia Mission Trip were showing on the screen. Rev. Michael Khol, Moderator, welcomed everyone and opened the meeting with prayer. He called the meeting to order and noted how good it was to be back together! Frank Breault, Clerk, had the roll call of churches. Ten churches were represented at the meeting. An announcement was made that the 188th JRBA Annual Fall Meeting will be held on Thursday, October 20, 2022,

at Mt. Zion Baptist Church, beginning at 4:45 PM. A brief Business Session was held to approve the Program and the Slate of Officers for 2022-2023. Not all positions have been filled, but folks were encouraged to volunteer for the roles of Discipleship Director, Baptist Men's Director, VBS Director, and Disaster Relief Coordinator. It was noted that Rev. Austin Williams will be stepping into the office of Treasurer in October. Rev. Jimmy Dunn spoke on the continuing Rise Against Hunger fund drive and encouraged everyone to give sacrificially to that effort. Rev. Michael Khol then recognized officers who stepped down during 2019 – 2021: Marilyn Snoddy served as Moderator (2 years) and Rev. Austin Williams served as Baptist Men's Director(1 year).

After a Prelude by Carolyn Tapscott, Rev. Khol led us in a Pastoral Prayer and we sang *Love Lifted Me*. Rev. Skip Wallace, our BGAV Field Strategist, updated us on happenings within Virginia Baptist life, highlighting the response to the Ukrainian refugees, the continuing work of Disaster Response Teams, various mission camps being held this summer, and Dr. John Upton's upcoming retirement. He also encouraged everyone to subscribe online for Advance Notice, the online BGAV newsletter, in order to stay informed. He thanked JRBA for partnering with BGAV to advance the Kingdom of Jesus Christ. Next, Marilyn Snoddy presented special music. She blessed us with two songs: *Jerusalem* and *Thank You for Your Blessings on Me*.

Rev. Geoff Bruschi, Arvon, was our worship speaker. He used the theme verse, Colossians 3:12, as his text. *Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience.* His message title was *Kingdom Living in the 21st Century.* After reading the theme verse, Geoff noted that a beautiful invitation for each of us is expressed in this verse. He noted that he would be giving us a REMINDER and an INVITATION.

The reminder was that God loves us...and the importance of never losing sight of that, but to claim it and have confidence in it. God didn't NEED us, He WANTED us and formed us in His image. He loves all people – He is that good. How can that fact motivate us to give and do? How could JRBA change if we accept that truth? God loves us – we are CHOSEN – His love is not based on us.

The invitation is to live out of the truth of God's love for all. We are living in divisive times and it is difficult to navigate the issues. We must clothe ourselves in the characteristics exhibited by Jesus, God's exact representation in the world. God has planted us where we need to be. Jesus is here with us and in us and wants to live through us. The plot of God's story is LOVE, as depicted in 1 John 4. If we are to win others to the Kingdom, we must exhibit Kingdom living, putting on *compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience!* When we do that, we will be centered in God's unending love. If each of us claim our "chosen-ness", take on the gentleness of Christ, and clothe ourselves in those traits, we can claim/reclaim others for the Kingdom!*

After singing the commitment hymn, I Surrender All, the service was closed in prayer by Mr. Doug Tapscott.
