

GLADSTONE MEMORIAL CELEBRATES 130 YEARS!



Gladstone Memorial Baptist Church has an interesting beginning. The residents of Gladstone saw a need for a church in 1892 and a soliciting committee was formed. The Chesapeake and Ohio Railway gave the land and \$250 towards the building costs. On October 30, debt-free, the C & O Baptist Church was dedicated to the service of God and preaching the Gospel. There were 12 charter members. Rev. E. P. Robertson was the first pastor, serving both this church and Mineral Springs Church.

In 1895, C & O joined the Albemarle Association. Soon after they began making contributions to state and foreign missions. In 1903, Gladstone joined the Piedmont Association and church membership stood at 32. Membership continued to increase and by 1921, there were 75 members.

In 1925, C & O joined the field of Liberty Chapel, New Hope, and Concord, and joined the James River Baptist Association. Their members provided some of the leadership for the association over the years: Mrs. O. L Brown served for nearly 30 years as WMU Superintendent and was the first Associational Historian. Several JRBA Moderators were from Gladstone Memorial: Rev. O. G. Burnett, Rev. W. A. Irving, Rev. G. M. Proffet, Rev. J. N. Williams, Al Carmody, and J. B. Hesson.

In 1929, C & O began an active WMU, sponsoring Sunbeams, Girls Auxiliary, and Royal Ambassadors. During the late thirties and early forties the Baptist Young People's Union was also active. Adult and Youth Choirs organized. Daily VBS was held for the children and young people of the church and other children in the community.

In 1947 the church was renamed Gladstone Memorial in tribute to the four members that served and lost their lives in WWII. In 1957, Gladstone and Liberty Chapel formed a church field and built a parsonage in 1968.

In 2004 Liberty Chapel and Gladstone Memorial sold the parsonage and Rev. James N. Williams became Gladstone's full-time pastor. He served both Gladstone and JRBA faithfully until his death in 2007.

In 2008, Dr. James Fetty became the pastor and church attendance started growing. Average Sunday School attendance was 35 and average worship attendance was 45. In 2010, the church had 54 resident members and 45 non-resident members.

The recent pandemic has impacted Gladstone Memorial in many ways, but their focus remains on providing a fulfilling church home for the members and meeting the needs of the unchurched persons in the community, with the emphasis on leading them to Christ through an awareness of the love that Christians show to others. Although their numbers have decreased, they continue to serve God faithfully.

On July 1, 2022, Gladstone celebrated their 130th Anniversary with a concert by Mark and Karen Templeton. The couple provided an evening of original compositions, acoustical music, and old Gospel favorites. There were approximately 40 in attendance who thoroughly enjoyed themselves and the music. An old-fashioned ice cream social followed the concert and the fellowship around the table was wonderful. Dr. Fetty extends his gratitude to all who came out and celebrated with them. He commented. "God has blessed and continues to bless Gladstone Memorial Baptist Church."

JRBA Quarterly Executive Board Meeting July 11, 2022

Rev. Michael Khol, Moderator, opened the meeting by sharing devotional thoughts based on Matthew 13:45 – 46: "Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant looking for fine pearls. When he found one of great value, he went away and sold everything he had and bought it. " Michael distributed to each person in attendance a sealed oyster containing a fresh water pearl. According to Jesus, the merchant in the parable is like the Kingdom of Heaven. He noted that he never really understood this, as he is not a collector of pearls. Only to a collector of pearls would one consider selling everything he had to buy a precious pearl. He compared this to how he is a conosieur of Legos and how some folks are car people or lovers/collectors of other things. To get a most prized item, one might sell all they had to purchase it. What we should take away from the parable is that God loves each of us like the merchant loved pearls. That kind of love doesn't really make sense to us in human terms, but God loves each of us so much that He sent His son to die for us. God sees each of us as precious to Him. He said for us to let the pearl he gave us be a reminder of how much God loves us. He then led in prayer. Micahel called the meeting to order and asked for the Roll Call of Churches.

There were 17 in attendance: 1 Pastor, 1 Inetim Pastor, 14 Church Representatives, and 1 visitor. The minutes of the April 11, Quarterly Executive Board Meeting were presented and approved. The minutes of the JRBA Semi-Annual Spring Meeting held on May 26, were presented and approved.

Next, the quarterly Treasurer's Report was presented. As of June 30, 2022, the checking account balance was \$35,812.44, which includes the following: Additional Missions Fund - \$900.00, Rise Against Hunger - \$5,031.78, Mission Trips - \$1,550.00, and Missions Blitz - \$898.52. Total receipts for the quarter were \$8.788.56, which includes the following: Churches - \$3,880.60, Individuals & Amazon Smile - \$130.71, Rise Against Hunger - \$2,147.78, Interest on checking - \$4.47, Bland (churches & individuals gifts) - \$2,150.00, and Missions Blitz (Individual donation) - \$500.00. Disbursements totaled \$8,403.06 which included Mission Trips (Bland Team, First Baptist Youth) - \$200.00, Annual Insurance Premium - \$435.00, Bland Minsitry Center - \$2,953.14*, and Baccalaureate (Fluvanna & Buckingham) - \$400.00. The report was approved as presented.

*Please note that the amount disbursed to Bland Ministry Center does not match the larger amount stated below in the Moderator's Report as some cash donations were made directly to the team and did not go through the JRBA books.

The John E. Mann, Sr. Benevolence Fund quarterly report was presented. There had been no requests for assistance during the quarter. Goshen contributed \$250 to the fund. The balance on hand stands at \$9,053.38.

MODERATOR REPORT: Michael made note that Fitzgerald Memorial now has an Interim Pastor, Vern Miller, who will be serving through August. He requested prayer for the family of Landon Raber, a 6-year old child who was missing in Buckingham County and found deceased this morning. He commended the churches for the giving to the Annie Armstrong Offering for N. A. Missions - a total of almost \$7,000 was contributed. He also noted the generous giving of 10 of our churches to the Bland Ministry Center and Team. With the \$500 in the JRBA Budget, a total of \$3,072.14 was donated to the center. He thanked the 7 team members who went to Bland and worked hard. Michael also mentioned that 12 JRBA churches have scheduled or help VBS this summer. Many of our churches are hosting Homecoming and Revivals in the coming weeks. He noted that details can be found in the JRBA newsletter. Michael noted that The Hope for Appalachia Team had a sucdessful trip to Kentucky and that pictures were shown at the Spring Meeting. He then thanked Austin Williams for taking on the role of JRBA Treasurer for 2022-2023, and thanked Judy Ownby for her dedicated service in that role.

SOUTHSIDE PREGNANCY SUPPORT CENTER: Donielle Yoder presented information on the work at the center.. She talked about the upcoming Walk 4 Life in three locations: Appomattox - September 3, Farmville - September 10, and Buckingham - September 17. This is one of three major fundraisers for the center each year. Participant and sponsor forms are available as well as volunteer applications. The PSC main office is in Farmville, with satellite offices in Appomattox, Buckinghamm, and Amelia. It is hopeful that a safellite office will soon open in Charlotte County as well. The PSC serves Prince Edward County and all seven surrounding counties. Although nothing changed in Virginia, the overturning of Roe vs. Wade has caused the center to get more calls and people are getting more informed. There is more support of LIFE and folks want to know how to help with this cause. Donielle talked about the main goal of the PSC: to introduce Jesus to the clients. She is there to share the Gospel with every person who calls or comes in for services. The PSC has recently added pregnancy testing, and ultrasounds are available at the Farmville location. The center's biggest need is for volunteers. There is online training for volunteers who actually meet with the clients. There is some need for non-client volunteers as well - this just requires an application, but no training. The Buckingham satellite only has one volunteer currently so get the word out if anyone is interested in getting trained and serving in that capacity. When clients come in for counseling, they earn "Baby Bucks" which they can then use to "purchase" items for their baby. Donielle also shared about PSC's new prayer ministry, "One at 1 PM". A current prayer request is texted to all participants to pray in one accord at 1 PM each Tuesday and Thursday. For further information on the PSC, to get volunteer applications, or Walk 4 Life forms, contact Donielle Yoder at 434-391-1011. Michael thanked Donielle for giving us an update on the work at PSC and encouraged all the churches to support it.

There were no Officers' Reports. The following Committee Reports were given:

MISSIONS: Rev. Jimmy Dunn noted that Gladstone Memorial had just celebrated their 130th Anniversary Celebration and that he was pleased to attend and would be preaching their Homecoming on October 2. He commended them on their commitment to Rise Against Hunger and how they had given \$906 to that cause, just by keeping a a jar on the communion table for folks to drop in their change. He also commended Jones Chapel for their contest between the boys and girls to raise funds for RAH, contributing over \$1,000! He also noted that Henry Wood had encouraged folks to donate at his 4th of July celebration and had raised \$276. Jimmy encouraged everyone to give what they can and thanked all who have given and will give prior to July 20. He also noted the importance of volunteering at the Blue Ridge Food Distribution at the Crystal Cathedral each 2nd and 4th Friday. He stressed how important it is for the folks coming to be greeted with the love of Jesus. Many are struggling during these times of high prices, and the food really makes a difference, but sharing God's blessing is just as important! Michael noted how much he appreciates Jimmy's faithfulness to RAH and the Food Bank. The Food Bank is making a difference in the community.

Gloria Newton, a member of the Hope for Appalachia Team to Kentucky in April, gave a short report on the work done there. She thanked the people and churches as what the team did could not have happened without the generousity of JRBA folks. She served on Rev. Woody Moore's team and they saw over 1,700 children. She is so thankful they could go into the schools and share the Gospel, explaining salvation and the love of Jesus. They didn't just give them Hope boxes, they gave them the HOPE OF JESUS CHRIST! She talked about the number of children who are being raised by grandparents or other family members. The area has high drug use and cancer rates and these have a negative impact on life for the children. The team met with the children in a large group setting with games, singing, etc. which was exciting. But they also broke down in to smaller groups and presented the paln of salvation and prayed with the students. She found that the students were open and shared some heart-breaking situations, asking the leaders to pray for them. Gloria shared how teachers wept and begged them to continue to come and share hope with the students. She noted how even a 99¢ yo-yo meant something to them as they opened their boxes! She encouraged everyone to continue to pray that the doors remain open to this ministry as principals are literally putting their jobs on the line to allow

HFA in – the boxes are the instrument, but the Hope is our Lord Jesus Christ. Gloria again thanked us for all we do and encouraged anyone who could to go with the team! You will be blessed!

BACCALAUREATE: A written report was presented. Several area churches, including 5 JRBA churches, participated in the card shower for BCHS graduates. Antioch Union prepared gift bags and stickers. JRBA contributed \$200 (budgeted) towards the refreshments for the inperson baccalaureate service. Antoch (Scottsville) prepared Gift Bags for the graduating class of Fluvanna High School. JRBA's budgeted amount (\$200) helped pay for mugs for each student. No outreach to the Cumberland graduates was initiated this year. (Kathy Weaver asked about this and was encouraged to help see that something is done next year as there is budgeted money to help with this outreach.)

There was no Old Business. Under New Business, a request for financial assistance was presented from Dwayne Phillips who is going to Honduras in a few weeks to work at the Emmanuel Orphanage to help with the replanting of crops and planning visit dates for future teams. Since Dwayne is not a member of a JRBA church, this needed the approval of the Executive Board. Money is in the budget for mission trips. Gwynn Tyler made a motion to give Dwayne \$100. It was seconded by Rev. Jimmy Dunn. The motion was approved.

An announcement sheet was included in the meeting packets. Michael reiterated the due date for Rise Against Hunger (July 20). Brenda McAllister asked if there is to be an in-person BGAV Annual Meeting this year. Michael noted that meeting plans are in the works and it is scheduled to be held in Hampton Roads, November 14 - 16. A reception for Dr. John Upton will be held on November 14. Rev. Jimmy Dunn also reminded everyone to write a note of appreciation (online) to Dr. Upton. (Further details were included in the July newsletter for your convenience.)

Audrey Ragland made a motion to adjourn. It was seconded by Rev. Austin Williams, and the meeting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. Michael Khol.

Learning to Say Goodbye

Deb and I have three children and one of the fascinating things about each of them were the first words they spoke. The first word for each of them was "bye-bye." It was not mama or daddy. It was "bye-bye." They each said it a lot once hey learned it. They would see you put on a coat, and you heard, "bye-bye." I remember one of them saying it to their crib one morning. Another siad to this bottle when they finished. Isn't it an interesting choice for a child's first word?

I know it is one of the easiest sounds we can make, but it also strikes me as an especially fitting first word because it is at the very core of what it means to grow and live, isn't it? Growing means saying lots of goodbyes. It means leaving many things behind. Frederick Buchner said, "To live is to leave, that is all."

Summer is a season of goodbyes. School stops, and countless friends say goodby for the summer to one another. Graduates say a more permanent kind of goodbye. Weddings imply a farewell; it is a departure event where parents proudly watch their children go away. Vacation time is full of goodbyes; we leave to see others whom we promptly leave again.

In any given week, how many goodbyes do you think you say? In person, on the phone, by the computer – how many? It is endless until all of it abruptly ends, and last goodbyes get said. I have had too many of those in recent days.

The Bible is full of goodbyes as well, because it is full of living. That is why there are so many benedictions or farewell blessings recorded. The most famous was for the priest to say, "May theLord bless you and keep you. May the Lord's face shine upon you and be geracious unto you. May the Lord lift his countenance upon you and give you peace."

Sounds a bit churchy, doesn't it? It is just how we would expect a minister by a stained-glass window to talk. Yet it is a leaving that intentionally leaves people blessed. I sure wish more of our goodbyes could be like benedictions.

Grady Nutt was a remarkable man who was dear to many people. He was a preacher, but primarily a humorist. He was a widely popular speaker and even was a regular on "hee Haw," a national TV show. He had a great mind and was an exuberant personality. He was a free spirit and was powerfully generous with love and laughter and huge hugs. A special memory I have is that Grady chaired my ordination council and preached the ordination message.

Grady died in a plan crash, and many gathered for his funeral. Several of us started sharing memories of Grady by asking, "What was the last thing he said to you/-can you remember?" We were all astonished to learn that the last words any of us could recall were the same words. Grady would say as we said our goodbyes, "love ya." Turns out Grady ended his conversations with friends saying, "love you."

Each of us recalled his words never sounded like a routine signoff. They sounded warm with genuine delight and real well-wishing as he signed off. To have that kind of benediction wash over you time and again by a special friend is to walk taller and have an expanded spirit. You find it easier to love and to laugh.

Do not ever understimate the power of a good last word to bless. Benediction means "a good wor." Why not leave one another more often with such a word?

Part of what this means is to make our goodbye a true departure. I think this is one of the kinder gifts we can give to one another, to release others rightly from ourselves. That may sound strange, since our goodbyes should communitcate we are still going to be holding each other in our hearts. A goodby is a letting go, which may mean sending them into their own freedom to grow. The good news is it is not sending them into the freedom alone. Goodbye literally means, "God be with you." Goodbye is releasing those you love to God.

I have had the honor of serving the BGAV for over 27 years, twenty of them as Executive Direcor. To say I love BGAV would be a classic understatement. How can you not love those with whom you have lived so fully? Thank you for the gift of your friendships, the gift of your wisdom, your faith, and your trust.

It is time for BGAV to be released with love to grow into its next self. So, at the conclusion of my role as Executive Director, I would like to offer this benediction: "May the God of love and peace be with you. May the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ and the love of the Heavenly Father and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you now and forever more."
