#### **CHURCH OUTREACH**

ANTIOCH (SCOTTSVILLE): On Saturday, October 22, we served 55 meals and gave out 55 food boxes at ehe Loaves and Fish Ministry event. 100 Kindergarten bags were filled for Hope for Appalachia, each containing 15 items: coloring book, pencil pouch, pencils, pencil sharpener, crayons, colored pencils, stickers, markers, stuffed animal, hat, gloves, glue stick, scissors, toothbrush, and toothpaste. Extra items were also donated to be given to the resource officers to hand out as needed. Coats and blankets were also collected. Items for the Fluvanna Women's Prison have also been collected. Our AWANA club started us off with 20 OCC shoeboxes and we hope to complete a total of 350 this year. Upcoming outreach includes feeding the Special Education Children of Fluvanna County on Nov. 4, hosting a Fall Festival/Vendor Fair on Nov. 5, providing coffee and breakfast snacks for voters on Nov. 8, and hosting our November Loaves and Fish meal on Nov. 19 (3<sup>rd</sup> Saturday due to Thanksgiving holiday).

ANTIOCH UNION: On October 18, we held Worship in the Park, with a Child Dedication, worship, and a meal of Brunswick stew, hot dogs, and desserts. The event was well attended and everyone enjoyed the time of fellowship in God's beautiful outdoor setting. We hosted a Trunk-or-Treat on October 29, with about 80 in attendance.

ARVON: The members of the church collected the following school supplies for the Buckingham Elementary School: 23 packages of notebooks and paper, 80 folders, 65 packages of pens, pencils, crayons, and markers, 14 scissors, 15 other miscellaneous office supplies (index cards, rulers, tissues, sandwich bags, hand sanitizer, and Post-It notes). The items were delivered on September 19.

BUCKINGHAM: The church joined with Calvary and Arvon to host a Fall Festival and Trunk-or-Treat on October 29. Members are collecting winter coats for Hope for Appalachia and will be doing OCC shoeboxes.

CEDAR: Women on Mission are still collecting coats, hats, gloves, etc. for the Hope for Appalachia Fall/Winter mission trip. WOM are also currently planning for their Thanksgiving Food Drive and for an Angel Tree. Several people from the church participated in the Walk for Life in Dillwyn on September 17, to raise money for the Southside Pregnancy Center.

CHESTNUT GROVE: Members are collecting coats and jackets for distribution through the Central Virginia Christian School's coat drive. They will be distributed to adults and children in the community. Nancy W. Morris and helpers distributed Gospel tracks and treat bags in downtown Farmville on Halloween.

ENON: Over 70 participated in the recent Children's Fall Festival! Praise the Lord for the new families that joined in! God is doing great things in the Children's Department and in the church!

FIRST BAPTIST DILLWYN: FBC served as the location for the Red Cross Bloodmobile on Wednesday, October 12. The church is also providing the meeting place for Kairos Prison Ministries as they prepare to minister at Buckingham Correction Center, November 2 – 6. Free meals for veterans and their spouses will be prepared and served on Veteran's Day, November 11. A Thanksgiving meal will be prepared and delivered by FBC members to over 100 shut-ins in the area on Sunday, November 20. Helping Hands continues to send over 50 cards each month to persons with special needs, provide gift cards and other help to those in need, recognize the school personnel from FBC, and help in other ways. Kathy Ranson, the new Sunday School Director, is leading each Sunday School Class to choose and carry out a special mission project to a group in need.

JONES CHAPEL: Due to Hurricane Ian, Rev. Jim Lamb was unable to travel to Virginia for Jones Chapel's Homecoming service. Interim Pastor, Rev. Lewis Brandt brought the message, with special music by "Real Truth Revival" followed by lots of food and fellowship. Many children and families attended the annual Family Fun Festival on October 22, and were treated to games, free food, Bingo, facepainting, prizes, and a favorite of the day – a hay ride through the pumpkin patch where each child was able to pick his/her own pumpkin! #### JRBA QUARTERLY EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING SUMMARY October 10, 2022

Gwynn Tyler, JRBA

Parliamentarian, announced that Marilyn Śnoddy, Moderator, could not attend and had asked him to preside. (Robert's Rules of Order allows for another officer to preside and conduct business if the Executive Board elects him/her as the Moderator Pro Tem for that session.) After a short devotion on what JRBA's mission has looked like in the past, Gwynn challenged us to continue to work together to see where God is leading us and how we can continue to follow Him in reaching out to those around us. He offered a prayer and had the Roll Call of Churches. There were 13 in attendance, representing 9 churches , and Rev. Skip Wallace, BGAV Field Strategist.

Rev. Jimmy Dunn made a motion that Gwynn Tyler preside over the meeting in the absence of the Moderator and Clerk (we do not currently have a Vice-Moderator). Audrey Ragland seconded the motion. Representatives in attendance voted to approve the motion.

The minutes of the July 2022 Executive Board Meeting were then presented and approved. The Treasurer's quarterly report was presented by Judy Ownby, outgoing Treasurer. As of 9/30/22, the checking account balance was \$33,175.30, wich includes the following: Additional Missions Fund - \$900.00, Rise Against Hunger - \$0.00, Missions Blitz - \$898.52, Mission Trips - \$1,250.00, Christian EducationTraining/Evangelism - \$500.00, and Baccalaureates - \$200.00. Total receipts for the quarter were \$9,945.54, which includes the following: Churches - \$7,090.18, Rise Against Hunger - \$2,742.25, Interest on checking - \$17.29, and Amazon Smile donations - \$8.49. Disbursements totaled \$12,482.68, which includes regular monthly bills plus Rise Against Hunger - \$7,774.03, Mission Trips (Jones Chapel to MC2 - \$100, Dwayne Phillips - Honduras - \$100, and Gas Money for

trailer of emergency supplies to Kentucky - \$100). The report was approved as presented.

Rev. Austin Williams, Treasurer, presented the Year End Report and the Proposed Budget as drafted by the Finance Committee on September 7. It was noted that all 18 member churches contributed to the regular budget during 2021-2022, giving a total of \$23,372.28, which was \$1,972.41 more than in the previous year. An individual and other contributions totaled \$217.72 for total receipts of \$23,590.00. Total contributions, including designated receipts, were \$33,860.46. Total expenditures were \$31,251.00, leaving a year end general fund checking account balance of \$33,175.30, and a saving account balance of \$4,379.91. The Total Proposed Budget for 2022-2023 is \$30,342.52. This amount includes \$648.52 of carryover designated funds for Missions Blitz. Therefore, the ACTUAL PROPOSED BUDGET is \$29,694.00, which includes increases of \$1,743 in Payroll (hourly increase for Secretary), \$100 in Miscellaneous (due to increase in expenditures), and \$800 in Technology (renamed from Copier Maintenance). The proposed budget includes the following: Missions – Missions Blitz: Previous years' designated donations will be carried forward, plus the regular budgeted amount of \$250.00. Total - \$898.52

<u>Additional Missions</u>: Donations to the following organizations remains the same (\$100 each): Southside VA Pregnancy Center, Grace Inside Prison Ministry, Gideons, Baptist Collegiate Ministry, Southside Fellowship of Christian Athletes, BGAV Disaster Relief, and Piedmont Habitat for Humanity.

Office Expenses – Miscellaneous: Due to increase in costs, the budget was increased by \$100. Technology (formerly Copier Maintenance): Increased by \$800 for the purchase of a new office computer.

<u>Payroll Expenses</u>: Increase in hourly rate of Secretary from \$12/hr. to \$15/hr. since the position has not had a salary increase for several years. The Finance Committee strongly felt this to be a needed adjustment to salary.

There were no questions or discussion and the Proposed Budget was approved unanimously as presented. (Pending approval by the Association at the Annual Fall Meeting on October 20, 2022) A copy of the entire budget can be found at the end of the newsletter.

Austin also presented a recommendation from the Finance Committee to assist pastors who wish to attend the Pastor's Teaching Conference, March 12-14, 2023, with \$50 each. It was approved as presented. Austin also noted that signers of the JRBA Checking Accounts need to be updated. Approved as the new Treasurer at the Spring Semi-Annual Meeting, he has been added. Rev. Michael Khol and Ms. Judy Ownby need to be removed from the Regular Checking Account and the Benevolence Checking Account. Rev. Jimmy Dunn made a motion to that effect; it was seconded and approved.

Betty Toney, Chair, presented the John E. Mann, Jr. Benevolence Fund Quarterly Report. No requests were approved and no disbursements were made July 1-September 30, 2022. Contributions included \$2,500.00 from Arvon and \$200 from Buckingham. The balance is \$11,753.28. The Benevolence Committee also recommended that the "cap" be increased on funds given for assistance from \$100 per occurrence to: Up to \$200 for assistance on overdue electric bills or other emergency needs as outlined in the guidelines, and up to \$300 for assistance when an individual or family experiences loss due to a home fire. This recommendation was approved as presented.

The Moderator's report was in the packet. But in Marilyn's absence, Gwynn highlighted several of her comments:

The faithfulness of Rev. Michael Khol while in JRBA and the need for someone to step into his role as the leader of the Missions Blitz. Thank you to all who have agreed to serve as officers for 2022-2023 and the need for folks to volunteer for the vacant positions. Five churches are currently without pastors. Antioch (Scottsville) has a new Associate Pastor, D.J. Carter, and a new Youth Pastor, Jenny Faulknier.

Encouragement for all to attend the Fall Meeting and invite others! Encouragement for all to give to BGAV Disaster Response. Thanks to those who made donations to the emergency needs in Kentucky.'

Emphasized the upcoming opportunities to provide warm winter wear to Hope for Appalachia, hygiene/stationery kits for Fluvanna Women's Prison, Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes, and for giving to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering.

Judy Ownby announced that their church is pleased to announce that they have called Rev. Dane Gressett as Pastor and he will begin on November 1.

Rev. Skip Wallace brought greetings from BGAV and reminded us of the BGAV Annual Meeting to be held November 14 – 16. He also encourage giving to BGAV Disaster Response. He thanked JRBA for supporting its pastors who wish to participate in the upcoming Pastors' Training Conference at Eagle Eyrie. (More info to come on that later.) Skip noted what a difficult time it is for pastors and churches who are seeking pastors. He then offered a prayer for the pastors and the churches of JRBA.

Betty Toney, WMU Director, gave her report. She mentioned that she, Rita Harris, and Nancy Morris recently attended the Leadership Conference at CrossRoads. She is hopeful that our WMU groups will be even more active in the coming months.

#### Committee Reports were then presented:

NOMINATING: In the absence of Rita Harris, Chair, her report was presented on the Updated Slate of Officers for 2022-2023. Gwynn Tyler has agreed to serve as Vice-Moderator. Four vacancies remain. The updated Slate of Officers was approved as presented. PROGRAM: The program for the 188<sup>th</sup> Annual Fall Meeting was presented. The committee also recommended that the offering be designated for the BGAV Disaster Response. The program and recommendation were approved as presented.

MISSIONS: The Mission Report (in the packet) enumerated the various mission efforts of the past quarter. Rev. Jimmy Dunn, Chair, talked about FBC's book study of *Something Needs to Change*, by David Platt. He recommended it highly. He noted that we need to work together to turn the world to Jesus Christ! He wants each church to continue to think about missions in our local area and what we can do to help those around us. He reminded everyone to get their warm winter items (HFA) in by November 9, and thanked everyone working with this effort. He asked for more volunteers to assist with the monthly food distribution at Crystal Cathedral on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Fridays of each month. He mentioned that our 2022 Rise Against Hunger donations were used to procure food in Dili, East Timor, Indonesia.

There was no old or new business, but Rev. Dunn asked us to show Judy Ownby our appreciation for her service as Treasurer with a round of applause.

The following announcements were made:

Rev. Austin Williams announced an upcoming Youth Retreat at Camp CrossRoads, January 6 – 8, 2023. (See information in the newsletter.)

Rev. Josh Morgan announced that the January 9, 2023, JRBA Quarterly Executive Board Meeting can be hosted by FBC.

After a number of prayer requests and a motion to adjourn, Rev. Austin Williams dismissed the meeting with prayer.

Thirty-eight messengers and one visitor convened at Mt. Zion Baptist Church on Thursday, October 20, 2022, for the 188th Annual Fall Meeting of the James River Baptist Association. Marilyn Snoddy, Moderator, presided. Rev. Woody Moore, host church pastor, gave a word of welcome and a short theme interpretation of John 9:14: Jesus said..."As long as it is day, we must do the work of him who sent Me. Night is coming, when no one can work." Rev. Moore mentioned several ways that JRBA has been working, and continues to work, for the cause of Christ.

Marilyn then called the meeting to order. She appointed Phyllis Tyler, Secretary, to take minutes in the absence of Frank Breault, Clerk. She then had the roll call of churches. There were 38 in attendance, representing 10 churches, with 1 visitor. Mrs. Snoddy presented the Program and the Program Committee's recommendation that the offering be sent to BGAV Disaster Response. Both the program and the recommendation were approved.

Rev. Skip Wallace brought greetings from BGAV and thanked JRBA for its partnership with BGAV in the Gospel. He noted the retirement of Dr. John Upton as Executive Director and announced the nominee for that position, Dr. Wayne Faison, who will be voted on at the BGAV Annual Meeting, November 14 – 16. He encouraged our churches to send messengers to the meeting, the first in-person gathering for 3 years. He made available copies of a summary reporting what BGAV has done in 2022, and the Pew Research Report, *Modeling the Future of Religion in America*. (Copies are available at the JRBA office upon request.) He encouraged us to continue to be the light and salt in our communities and to continue to be faithful to missions.

Mrs. Audrey Ragland then led us in a Memorial Recognition of members who were deceased from October 1, 2021 – September 30, 2022. She noted that D. L. Moody, at the end of his life, encouraged Christians to strive to live our lives towards the goal of 2 Timothy 4:7: I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith! The names of our 32 members who went to be with the Lord were then read aloud. Audrey noted that it is now our turn to step up to the plate and be a light to others following in the footsteps of those who have gone before us.

#### REPORTS:

<u>Time/Place/Preacher</u>: The 188<sup>th</sup> Spring Meeting will be held on Thursday, May 11, 2023, at Jones Chapel Baptist Church. The 189<sup>th</sup> Annual Fall Meeting will be held on Thursday, October 19, 2023, at Mulberry Grove Baptist Church.

Moderator: JRBA has been very busy for the Lord during 2021-2022. Marilyn highlighted the work done through Hope for Appalachia. Finance Committee/Treasurer: Rev. Austin Williams, Treasurer, gave the year end report for 2021-2022 and presented the Proposed Budget for 2022-2023. (See notes on Executive Board Summary for details. A copy of the budget also appears at the end of the newsletter.) Approved by the Executive Board on October 10, the budget was presented to the body for its approval. The Budget was adopted as presented.

Nominating Committee: The updated Slate of Officers for 2022-2023 was presented, including the approval by the Executive Board of Gwynn Tyler as Vice-Moderator. There were no volunteers for the vacant positions. The Slate of Officers was approved as presented. Missions: Rev. Jimmy Dunn said that it had been an honor to serve as the Missions Committee Chair and asked Marilyn to get someone else to head up the committee for next year. He thanked everyone for their hard work on all of the mission projects. He expressed his appreciation for Rev. Michael Khol's leadership in ministry to the Hispanics of the area and in heading up work projects for Missions Blitz. Jimmy emphasized the need for someone to head up this important work in our area. He thanked Rev. Woody Moore, Rev. Roger Woody, and Wayne Gough for their continuing work with Hope for Appalachia. He thanked everyone for their generosity in giving to Rise Against Hunger and to the volunteers who help at the Blue Ridge Food Distribution each month. He encouraged others to get involved in that ministry. He encouraged JRBA to continue to do all we can to reach others for Jesus Christ.

Marilyn then presented the 2021-2022 Book of Reports for approval. It was approved as presented. (Copies will be sent to churches who were not represented at the Annual Meeting.)

Marilyn then recognized the following outgoing officers and thanked them for their service:

Ms. Judy Ownby, Treasurer (2017-2022) Mr. Frank Breault, VBS Team Leader (2008-2022) Rev. Woody Moore, Disaster Response Coordinator (2017-2022)

Richard Carner, Cedar, presented a booklet written and distributed by the Fellowship Sunday School Class of Cedar Baptist Church, entitled *Are You Wondering Where All the People Went?*. It is written specifically for those left behind in the Rapture. It can also be read before the Rapture, to help someone know how to be saved through Jesus Christ. Copies were available for pick up and it can be reproduced. If anyone would like additional copies, please let someone at Cedar Baptist know.

Rev. Woody Moore then showed pictures and told about his recent trip to SW Virginia where he served with the BGAV Disaster Response Team, in conjunction with other groups (Samaritan's Purse, God's Pit Crew, Red Cross, and WV Baptists). He served as a Crisis Care Chaplain, but also helped with assessing damage to homes to establish recipients of rebuild assistance. He noted that serving with Disaster Response is an opportunity to experience "the church being the church" in times of need. He worked in Whitewood County and into Tazewell and the Keen Mountain area. The flooding was devastating in those areas. 10 homes were completed in Hurley, hit by flooding last year. First, Disaster Response goes in with feeding crews and mud-out crews who clean houses and put tarps on roofs. After homes dry out, rebuilds are done. Rebuilds through VBDR are done for individuals/families who do not have insurance or do not quality for FEMA assistance. About 300 rebuilds were assessed in the

Whitewood area, flooded by the Dismal River. Two homes have been finished, ten more are in progress, and there are 30 more yet to be done. Work was also being done simultaneously in Kentucky, Buchanan County, and in Florida after it was hit by Hurricane Ian. Feeding units in Florida served 20,000 meals per day. Chain saw crews were sent there as well The causeway was rebuilt in only 5 days. Disaster Response is at work for Jesus – meeting people in their time of need, being the hands and feet of Jesus! Rev. Moore also informed us that he is also trained to lead Sexual Abuse Training through the Virginia Department of Health and BGAV Disaster Response. Currently all materials are available for free. He recommended that all church leadership be trained. The training focuses on preventing sexual abuse and also how to deal with sexual abuse. Call him or BGAV to sign up for training sessions in your church.

Danny Lightfoot then gave the benediction and blessing for the meal.

After a delicious meal and fellowship around the table, folks came back to the sanctuary for worship. Additional guests came for the service.

Carol Ownby opened the service with a Prelude and everyone joined in singing, *Thank You Lord, for Saving My Soul.* Marilyn gave the Invocation and everyone sang *Majesty.* Rev. Jimmy Dunn led the Installation and Commissioning Service for the 2022-2023 Officers. He thanked each for their willingness to serve and challenged all others to support the officers in the work of the association. He prayed for the officers and the work of JRBA.

Everyone joined in singing the offertory hymn, *Trust, Try, and Prove Me.* An offering of \$656.00 was collected for BGAV Disaster Response.

Marilyn then introduced Lynn Cooper, from North Carolina. Lynn presented a moving testimony through word and song. Lynn told about her difficult life of abuse and neglect as a child and teenager. She shared how God saved her from that life and how He used her husband to bring her out of a life of abuse and a pattern of bad choices and into God's saving Grace. Her poignant testimony, interspersed with songs sung beautifully, with conviction and power, readily demonstrated her dependence on, and confidence in, God! She shared the following musical selections:

There Ain't No Grace Gonna Hold My Body Down His Life for Mine I will Sing of the Goodness of God You Were There, Always There, With Me Sometimes I Just Want to Thank You If You Knew Him Like I Know Him

Lynn shared how everyone struggles, but God has a plan for each one of us. Each one can be something, despite any struggle, with God. She turned down two offers to be produced because she only wanted to sing Gospel and she wanted to have a family and be with them. She now feels like the most blessed woman in the world. Though she still has struggles, she wants to share her story because she knows someone needs to hear it and how God rescued her for service.

Her testimony was moving and uplifting, a passionate portrayal of God's love and His care. All in attendance were truly blessed by her story and her music.

The service ended with everyone joining in singing, *Blest Be The Tie*, and a closing prayer by Rev. Woody Moore.
