Team members met at First Baptist Dillwyn on Sunday, May 21, to head out for the Bland Ministry Center. Rev. Jimmy Dunn, and Jane, came to see them off and Jimmy prayed for the team, their safety, the work they would do, and for the mission of the Bland Ministry Center. After a bit of a late start, due to a flat tire on Wayne's trailer, the group had an uneventful and safe journey in the beautiful sunshine. They stopped in Wytheville for supper at Cracker Barrel where they enjoyed the beginning of a great week of fellowship!

Although the team had plenty of aches and pains throughout the week, much was accomplished and relationships were built, both amongst the team members and with the staff, volunteers, and clients of the center. The team worked alongside the regular volunteers, women from a halfway house, and individuals completing community service obligations. Friendships were forged and blessings flowed for all concerned. The group was able to assist with various tasks around the center and in the community.

A large degree of energy was expended in the Food Warehouse where team members unloaded trucks, packaged food, and packed food boxes for the clients. They assisted with food distribution on Tuesday and Thursday when 200+ families received food, fresh produce, and other grocery items.

Some of the women also helped in the Clothing Closet sorting, hanging, and re-bagging clothes for distribution and shipment to other facilities. Team members also were blessed to assist a gentleman in the area who was suffering from cancer and who had lost his wife. The team bleached and powerwashed his porch, siding, and shutters. Some repairs were made and the porch was painted. They also planted flowers in his planters to help remind him of his wife and to provide encouragement to him. Additionally, the men organized the tools and other accessories at BMC and some yardwork was completed. Two large picnic tables were scraped and painted as well. A couple of repairs were also made in the volunteer house: the dishwasher filter was cleaned and a ceiling was repaired. All in all, a lot of physical work was completed, but more importantly, folks were able to show the love of Jesus in their treatment of those with whom they worked and served. Words of encouragement as well s the Gospel was shared in word and deed as the occasion arose. At the end of the week, the women from the halfway house expressed their gratitude for the loving way they were treated and shared a presentation of the Armor of God with team members.

One of the long-time volunteers with whom our teams have connected over the years was awaiting both bladder and heart surgery – team members were able to encourage her and a monetary gift was given to help her out with expenses. She was very touched. The team was also able to visit the Kissito Nursing Home where Wayne and Linda Gough sang and team members visited and encouraged the residents as they worshiped together through music. Many smiles, singing, and clapping of hands showed the obvious enjoyment of the time together. What a blessing to be able to give them a spot of cheer and share God's love!

The team had the pleasure of delivering 380 jars of peanut butter and 117 boxes of Zip Loc bags for use in the ministry center due to the generosity of all of you in our churches. Your monetary donations enabled us to also present the BMC with \$2,354.68 to help with their ministries.

189th JRBA Semi-Annual Spring Meeting May 11, 2023

The 189th Semi-Annual Spring Meeting of the James River Baptist Association met at Jones Chapel Baptist Church on Thursday, May 11,

2023. Forty-one messengers and one visitor were in attendance. Seven of the messengers were JRBA Pastors/Interims. There were an additional seven folks from Jones Chapel to help out with the meal and other jobs.

Registration began at 5:45 PM - during registration attendees looked over the program and informational packet and/or watched a slide presentation from the Bland 2022 Mission Trip and the Hope for Appalachia 2023 Spring Trip. These mission efforts were outlined in the day's packet, along with information on our Rise Against Hunger efforts. The meeting was opened at 6:00 PM by Rev. Dane Gressett, Pastor, Jones Chapel, with a welcome and theme interpretation. The theme for our meeting was II Corinthians 8:11: Now finish the work, so that your eager willingness to do it may be matched by your completion of it, according to your means. Rev. Gressett noted that both Chapters 8 & 9 of Corinthians were devoted to a multi-church project of receiving benevolence offerings for the people in Judea suffering during a famine. Paul was thrilled that the Christians wanted to help those in need. They were doing so in the image of Jesus - exhibiting grace to people in need! They had received His grace and were extending grace to others. We also need to focus on the grace we have received and exhibit it naturally and with compassion to those around us who are in need. We need to overflow with God's grace and seek to reach others with it. His grace comes through salvation and stays with us. Jesus's grace needs to flow in and through us. We can't just begin well - we need to finish well. God wants us to end with greater grace than we started with. In Philippians 1:6, Paul says, Being confident of this, that he who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus. In the Old Testament, Jacob blessed both of Joseph's sons and worshiped, leaning on his staff. He was nearing the end of his journey, but he continued to bless and worship! Rev. Gressett encouraged us to depend on the grace of God, to continue to ask for more grace, and to keep a tender heart...to end well! He then gave directions for the fellowship dinner and gave the blessing for the food.

Everyone enjoyed a delicious meal and good fellowship around the table. Jones Chapel served up delicious BBQ (prepared by Pastor Dane) and fried chicken. The good cooks from Jones Chapel and across the Association served up yummy sides and desserts, too. No one should have gone away hungry. After the meal, folks reconvened in the sanctuary for a brief business session and worship.

Carol Ownby played a prelude, after which Mrs. Marilyn Snoddy, Moderator, called the meeting to order and made several comments. She noted that Rev. Jimmy Dunn could not be in attendance and sent his regards as well as encouragement for everyone to give generously to our Rise Against Hunger efforts. Donations need to be in by June 30 in order to schedule a meal-packing event later in the fall. She asked everyone to be sure to pray for the Bland Mission Team and the work of the Bland Ministry Center and she expressed our thanks for the generous donations of peanut butter and Zip Loc bags. Marilyn then presented the Nominating Committee's Report and the Slate of Officers for 2023 – 2024 for approval. The Slate of Officers was approved as presented, with several positions vacant at this time.

The Bland Mission Team members were then called to the front and Rev. Tommy Armstrong, Cedar, led a Commissioning Service for them. He noted that a commissioning service is for both the team and the folks in the churches who are doing the sending. He noted the question Paul raised to the Christians in Rome, "How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can they preach unless they are sent?" (Romans 10:14-15) The team was thanked for their willingness to go and serve and encouraged to not only work to bless others, but to also be ready to share the Good News of Jesus Christ. Others in attendance were challenged to pray for the team and the work they will do as well as for the opportunities they will encounter to bless others and share the Gospel. Rev. Armstrong then anointed each team member with oil in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It was a touching and memorable ceremony. He then prayed for the team.



Worship continued with the singing of the hymn, *Brethren, We Have Met to Worship*. Rev. Steve Emery, Fitzgerald, led in the Pastoral Prayer and the congregation joined him in the Lord's Prayer. Rev. Dane Gressett gave the Offertory Prayer and the offering was received. A total of \$283 was given for the Bland Mission efforts. Jones Chapel then presented a program of Special Music. Graham Donahue played the guitar and sang a song he had written, *I've Got A Better Life in Mind* and played a a beautiful arrangement of *He Leadeth Me* - what a blessing to see and hear this young man using his talents for the Lord! Then Rev. Gressett, Carol Ownby, and Judy Ownby sang the following selections, accompanied by Rev. Gressett on the guitar: *The Uncloudy Day, Little Is Much When God Is In It, Just Over In the Glory Land*, and *There's Power in The Blood*.

Marilyn thanked Jones Chapel for graciously hosting our meeting, the Social Committee for serving the meal, and Rev. Gressett and the singers for a meaningful time of worshipful music. She then led the singing of the commitment hymn, *Take My Life, and Let It Be.* She closed the meeting with prayer.
