

JRBA Quarterly **Executive Board** Meeting July 10, 2023

Marilyn Snoddy, Moderator, opened the JRBA Quarterly Executive Board Meeting with a devotional on Lamentations 3:22-24.: Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed. for his compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. I say to myself, "The Lord is my portion; therefore I will wait for him." Disaster had come to Jerusalem as forewarned by Jeremiah. Lamentations is a book of laments and asks how the inhabitants of the land will respond to the loss. The author found hope in the midst of his affliction when he turned his thoughts to God! Despair never has the last word so we don't need to despair. Marilyn sang, Good Morning, Mercy and then led in prayer.

Marilyn called the meeting to order. In the absence of Frank Breault (Clerk), Gwynn Tyler had the Roll Call of Churches. There were 20 representatives + 1 visitor in attendance from 10 member churches. The minutes of the April Executive Board Meeting were presented and approved. The minutes of the JRBA Semi-Annual Spring Meeting were presented and approved.

Rev. Austin Williams, Treasurer, presented the Quarterly Treasurer's Report. As of March 31, 2023, the checking account balance was \$30,554.70, which includes the following: Additional Missions Fund -\$900, Mission Trips - \$1,250.00, Rise Against Hunger - \$7,973.27, Missions Blitz - \$898.52, Christian Education/Training/Evangelism -\$326.27, and Baccalaureates - \$25.37. Total receipts for the guarter totaled \$11,506.50, which included donations from JRBA Churches -\$3,073.00, Amazonsmile.com - \$27.62, Interest on checking - \$3.85, Rise Against Hunger donations - \$6,101.28, Bland - \$2,303.00. Disbursements totaled \$11,157.57, including Mission Trips (Bland, 3 Youth teams) - \$400.00, Bland (team and Bland Ministry Center)-\$2,853.00 and Copier Purchase - \$3,827.00. The current checking account balance on hand is \$31,395.24. There are two outstanding checks totaling \$464.99. The CD Account Balance as of June 30, 2023, equals \$10,100.57. Also included in the meeting packet was a report of the Budget vs. Actual Expenditures-to-date listing line items and the remaining funds available. From that report, \$15,920.95 has been expended (Budget = \$30,342.52), with remaining budgeted items of \$14,421.57. The Treasurer's Reports were approved as presented.

Mrs. Betty Toney, Chair, presented the quarterly Benevolence Fund report. From April 1 - June 30, 2023, one individual ws assisted with a night's lodging and one individual was assisted with gas for travel to dialysis treatments. Total Disbursements: \$115.00. A \$50 donation was received from Enon. Two outstanding checks never were cashed and were added back to the checking account (Total: \$231.10). Available funds stand at \$6,893.48.

Next, Marilyn gave the Moderator's Report. She noted that 4 youth groups participated, or will participate in mission camps this summer. She thanked Jones Chapel for hosting the spring meeting in May and for proviiding the music and delicious BBQ. The Meet 'n Greet with Dr. Wayne Faison was held on April 17 at Mulberry Grove and was well attended. The JRBA Bland Mission Team had a productive trip to work at the Bland Ministry Center. A total of \$2,354.88 was given to the center and several of our churches collected peanut butter and Zip Loc bags for the food ministry there. Marilyn mentioned the Youth Awakening Revival held at Antioch (Scottsville) in late April and how important it is that we reach our young people for the Lord. She asked that we remember in prayer our churches as they host VBS, Homecomigs, and Revivals in the coming weeks. The response to our Rise Against Hunger fundraiser has been amazing, with \$9,075.27 in hand for a meal-packing event. Phyllis has been working on a new JRBA Directory which she hopes to get out soon. Marilyn also announced the resignation of Rev. Perry Clore from Sharon Baptist and asked that everyone pray for our churches without pastors. She thanked all our churches for what they are doing for the Kingdom!

Mrs. Betty Toney, JRBA WMU Director, expressed gratitude to Antioch Union for hosting the Annual Spring Meeting where Gwynn Tyler and Shawn Morris made presentations on their Honudras mission trips. A BCM Ministry Update was included in the packet from Rev. Cadance Tyler, inviting folks to attend the Open House at Longwood BCM on August 10 and 11. It also included a request for work teams prior to the open house. Rev. Jimmy Dunn, Sunday School Director, reminded everyone to be sure to reach out to new children/families involved in summer VBS to get them involved in Sunday School.

Next, Committee Reports were given:

MISSIONS: Brenda McAllister, Co-Chair, presented a motion from the committee that the 2023 Rise Against Hunger Meal-Packing Event be held on Sunday, October 15, at Maysville Baptist, at 3:00 PM. The motion was approved. Gwynn Tyler spoke briefly about the Bland Mission Trip. Eight people went this year and had a good trip. They were involved in the food ministry, clothing ministry, singing at a nursing home, and completing some repairs on an individual's home. Next year's trip is scheduled for May 19 - 25. Marilyn noted that Gwynn is available to churches to give presentations on both his Honduras trip and the Bland Mission Trip. Rev. Woody Moore spoke about the upcomiing Hope for Appalachia mission trip scheduled for Nov. 29 - Dec. 2. Winter items are needed: new or gently used coats, new hats, gloves and blankets. All items are due by November 8. He thanked everyone for their support for Hope and asked for prayers for the team. A team is in place and no additonal applications are needed as a smaller team is needed for the fall trip.

BACCALAUREATE: Reports were included from each of the county chairpersons. BUCKINGAHAM: A baccalaureate service was held at Buckingham High School on May 7, with 29 seniors in attendance. After the service, Gideons distributed Bibles to the seniors and a small receiption was held. All seniors received gift bags at graduation which included cards of encouragement from some JRBA churches CUMBERLAND: The baccalaureate service for Cumberland High School was hosted by Tar Wallet on May 9. Seven seniors were in attendance. After the service, refreshments were served and gift bags were given to the graduating seniors. FLUVANNA: Antioch Baptist Church prepared and distributed gift bags to the Fluvanna High School seniors at their graduation on May 26. JRBA provided funds (up to \$200) to each of these Senior outreach efforts as budgeted.

FINANCE: Rev. Austin Williams presented a motion from the Finance Committee to allocate \$100 from the Evangelism Line Item towards the Youth rally hosted by Antioch (Scottsville), scheduled for August 8. The motion was approved.

BGAV: Rev. Skip Wallace, our BGAV Field Strategist, was in attendance and noted that of all the associatons in his region, JRBA is as active as any and more active than several of the associations. He encouraged us to keep up the good work. He also thanked us for hosting Dr. Faison in April. He noted that the 200th Annual Meeting of the Baptist General Association of Virginai will be on November 13 -15, 2023, at Bon Air Baptist Church and encourage folks to attend. He also noted that Missions Connection 2 will be in progress at Eagle Eyrie July 17 - 21 and encouraged folks to go and see what it looks like! Skip noted the rise in churches without pastors over the last two years and asked that we pray for our pastors, our churches, and our churches without pastors. He also announced that BGAV is planning several Digitally Proficient Workshops in the near future and he will let us know when one is scheduled in Charlottesville. He encouraged all to attend one of these workshops designed to help churches with their digital outreach.

NEW BUSINESS:

Rev. Austin Williams presented a plan for JRBA to formerly adopt the Knights' Pantry Ministry at the Buckingham County High School . He made a motion that a Knight's Pantry Committee be formed to oversee the food/clothing pantry and the utilization of donated funds. Additionally a separate bank account will be set up for this fund to be managed by the JRBA Treasurer. (JRBA will invite other area churches to participate; the pantry will have specific food items and clothing available for the students; the pantry will be housed in a basement room, students will be give opportunities to go to the pantry for needed items; once logistics are worked out with the school, details will be in the JRBA newsletter as to how our churches can participate in this outreach.) The motion was seconded and approved. Austin also made a motion to nominate himself as the Chair of the Knights' Pantry Committee to serve along with Michelle Wright and Stephani Jones (both teachers at the high school). The motion was seconded and approved.

Gwynn Tyler presented some information on a BGAV Partnership with Food for the Hungry in Nicaragua. The program works with the people there to educate them on how to grow their own food. Several large BGAV churches are partnering with BGAV in this effort and he is wondering if any of our churches or the association would like to get involved with this ministry. A question was raised about the margin of cost of administration as compared to Rise Against Hunger. Information on this ratio has not yet been looked into, but will be. Skip Wallace noted that some larger BGAV churches have partnered directly with specific Nicaraguan communities whereas some churches/associatons just make monetary donations. This program is trying to change the culture of dependancy. Rev. Woody Moore and Rev. Jimmy Dunn commented that we should not drop Rise Against Hunger. Skip noted that BGAV is developing various ways to get involved in this new partnership and suggested that we contact Craig Waddell for additional information or to come and speak about it. Gwynn will get more information if there is an interest. No action was taken.

Liz Steger announced that she had received a letter from Charles Kirby, Coordinator for the Department of Emergency Services, asking for any local or non-profit organizations who are interested in working with them to be in contact. ANNOUNCEMENTS:

In addition to the printed announcements, Rev. Woody Moore announced that there would be a Stewards of Children Training at Mt. Zion on July 13, at 7 PM. He reminded us that he is available to do the training in other churches as well.

Rev. Jimmy Dunn announced that volunteers are needed to help with the Blue Ridge Food Distributions at Crystal Cathedal on the 2^{nd} and 4^{th} Fridays, especially this summer.

The meeting was then closed with prayer by Rev. Skip Wallace.
