# CHURCH OUTREACH



## BGAV Annual Meeting at Bon Air Baptist, Richmond November 13 – 15

Celebrating 200 years of Virginia Baptist history provided an inspiring time of preaching, music, learning, praying, and fellowship with folks from across the state and the world. There were 19 in attendance from JRBA, representing 6 of our churches. Everyone agreed that this was one of the best annual meetings they could remember. 1000+ messengers and guests gathered for the event.

The theme of the meeting was *Called to Be* and the preaching focused on what we are called to be as Virginia Baptists of the future. On Monday night, Rev. Brooke Holloway Blake spoke on how we are *Called to Be God's People*. Music by the Virgina Agape International Choir was amazing, with a number being performed in Korean and one in Latin, as well as several selections in English. On Tuesday morning, Dr. Fred Anderson regaled attendees with a message on *Called to Be His Servants*. Wonderful music was provided by a special Anniversary Festival Choir. On Tuesday evening, Dr. Robert Smith presented a challenging message on *Called to Be God's Prophets*. The Virginia Baptist Women's Chorale and Virginia Baptist Men's Chorale sang several beautiful selections. Prior to the business session on Wednesday morning, attendees were blessed by the Community Voices group, who had the place moving in the spirit! Worship on Wednesday morning featured Dr. Wayne Faison, Executive Director, as the speaker. He talked about how we as Christians and Virginia Baptists are *Called to Be God's Anointed!* When we are called to be God's anointed, we're called to be available, active, and amazing! During this service, special music was provided by The Miller Trio and soloist, Philip Brown. During the gatherings, everyone was also blessed by the music from Bon Air's Praise Band, the Piano Duo of David Hill and Betty Robertson, a Hispanic Worship Band, and combined bell ringers from FBC Richmond, Bon Air, and Grandin Court churches. The music was phenomenal!

Throughout the meetings, video clips emphasizing the rich history of Virginia Baptists were shared, giving participants a view into our past and how Virginia Baptists have impacted the world for the Kingdom. Breakout sessions provided opportunities to learn about various Virginia Baptist initiatives, resources, and programs. A new initiative called *Renew Virginia* was introduced. During the meeting, the 2024 BGAV Cooperative Mission Budget of \$7,061,860 (reduced from 2023) was approved. Officers for 2024 were elected: President – Becky McKinny, 1<sup>st</sup> Vice-President – Shelton Miles, 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice-President – Alan F. Miller, and Clerk – Nathan Taylor. The Executive Board and Chair were elected, Committee Chairs and retiring Executive Board Members were recognized. Resolutions of Appreciation were presented for retiring BGAV personnel: Glenn Akins, John Chandler, David Coggins, Laura McDaniel, and David Olive. Along with others from across Virginia, Rev. Dave Vogt and Rev. Austin Williams were elected to the BGAV Mission Council to serve from JRBA for the next 3 years. Marilyn Snoddy was recognized for her service on the Mission Council for several years. A Memorial Service highlighted the loss of many Godly leaders who passed away this past year. Two of our own were included: Rev. Joe Stanley and Mrs. Jackie Davenport.

There were many perks for messengers at the 200<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting: All messengers received a special Souvenir Journal by Dr. Fred Anderson outlining much of the history of Virginia Baptists. Special anniversary mugs were given out and everyone was invited to a 200<sup>th</sup> Birthday Celebration on Tuesday evening featuring birthday cake/cupcakes, tasty refreshments, and cranberry punch. 
